But you know, and you're talking about grandchildren. And now I I get to be part of that conversation. But, you know, eventually it almost always turns into where somebody has a share, something about some child that we used to teach. But. Anyway, when when my friend Joan retired from teaching, she was still pretty young and she's always been a very giving person, and so she decided that she wanted to. Starter program for the blind people, low low vision, and so she. Rogram and I don't. I don't know all the particulars, but anyway, what basically happened is she got all this radio equipment and we read we I didn't really do that much of it until I retired. But sometimes in the summer she would. She, with a bunch of volunteers, would read the newspaper. Our our newspaper for it was actually an hour and a half. It was live radio, so and there were always two readers because maybe somebody has to go to the bathroom. Maybe you suddenly get you start coughing, but we.

You know we would. Mark the newspaper up in advance so you would take turns. OK, this is gonna be your article. This is gonna be my article. And so lots of times, you know you would. We would. I know in the beginning. I I got the newspaper at home. I would actually read the newspaper in advance because I knew I, you know, you don't want to be sitting there reading live and then trying to say a word. And so I would like, look for challenging words or or.

Call it either. Let's say there was a local politician and I wasn't sure how to pronounce her name. I'm sure other people just went with it, but I'm, you know, I'm **** that way.

Mm-hmm.

So I spent a lot of time. You know, I had a time. Anyway, I'd go into the studio and we'd, we'd have our session, read the, read the news and and after the first hour, then we would the last half hour we would read another newspaper, oftentimes or just newspapers.

Put it in the area, but would only come out once a week or something. Well, there was this little community. The nearby called Blue Lake Blue Lake I I could. It's only got a few 100 people and I'm even surprised they have a newspaper. But anyway, so I'm reading as I did this a little more often. I got more comfortable and I I I wouldn't look at the paper. I had a time and just.

You know, So what? You make a mistake and.

Yeah.

Pete Springer

Ohh I should also say well, you know as I'm on live radio so that we were on our very high frequency. I don't even know the particulars of how it worked, but people could TuneIn to our broadcast and this is their way of getting the news. So it was a really. What a wonderful. My idea anyway, so I'm reading along one day I'm reading the Blue Lake News and there's the crime report section and I'm sitting next to my good friend Brenda, who was one of the main volunteers. And and I begin to read this article.

And it's so ridiculous. II, you know, I can't hardly keep a straight face. And I it's it's the kind of thing where when you're with a friend and your friend starts giggling and then. You get a case of the good.

And I'm like, you know, it's so simple. I'm I I. It's not like we have this massive audience, but I know I'm on live radio and I'm trying to keep it together. Well, I have to. I'll share the a little bit of the story cause that's yeah, that's what makes this. So I'm reading along and it it's about.

It talks about this woman who called the police because someone passing by her house. Got on her riding lawn mower and started mowing the grass and I'm like I'm trying to picture the scene here and and it's it goes on and on. It's just kind of elaborate story and how the how the woman asks the man to get off the mower.

But he wouldn't get off her mower, and he continued to mow, and so she ends up eventually calling and calling the police. And you know, you can imagine that call into dispatch.

Right, right. Right. He's on my mower, right?

And what that would have sounded like, well, I'm anyway I'm. I'm reading along and it's the whole thing is just comical, but I'm I'm reading along and, you know, and she gets a case of the giggles and she's not. She's not laughing out loud, but she's sitting right next to me. And and I could feel her shoulders start. And and finally it just as I in the middle of reading the article, I finally lost it and I, you know, I mean, I've been in situations like that before, but I've always been able to restrain myself. I start laughing out loud. She starts laughing out loud and then, you know, what do you do?

Where and you try to try to get it to. Heather and you apologize to your audience or whatever, but it's just one of those situations where Oh my God.

When you think about the person doing dispatch going OK, what do I do with this? Like, you know, theft of a lawn mower, unauthorized mowing? And I'm thinking really trespassing is probably the best they could get, right?

Exactly. Exactly. And here you know I. Mean just somebody even get the idea. Think I'll off on this person's mower and start mowing their lawn.

Yeah, I hope he was doing stray lines, I mean. Ohh.

Oh, oh, we could be doing crop circles. Ohh yeah, I just my first thought when I read the piece, Pete and just I busted out laughing cuz. It's just so.

I'm. I was laughing before you. You even described it. You know, for our listeners. But the thing I couldn't get past was. It was kind of like a joyride, right? Yeah, yeah.

I think she did this for like, 10 years Monday through Friday and lined up lots of people in the community to to, you know, because yeah, obviously we we have busy lives. And one of the really, really cool things she did, she was she Joan, the one that started the program. She's into theater. She's into music. And so she, during our local theater productions. She had a like a benefit for the blind and so. During the show, I think she maybe during the maybe month or so that the show ran, she would. One night she would have. An event just for people with limited vision. And so it's like, well, how does that work? You're you're thinking, you know, they're going to the theater. Yeah. You can hear the actors, and I'm sure you can just, you know, make distinctions in their voices and everything.

But I and and I would think you would be able to enjoy it. But the way the event started, I I thought that was really cool. She would get out there ahead of time and she would describe the setting to the audio. And so the audience was made-up of of people that were blind and people that weren't. But it was just very cool because you could kind of, you know, she just was very elaborate in her description and such that, you know, over here we have a a kitchen and she would describe it in in.

Are the kind of things that I find most inspiring, because then it just like, wow, if they can do that, why can't I?

Right, yeah.

You know, and so II think my whole approach in retirement. It's been, you know, this is my time to give back. I have the time now and I and if I if I do it, then maybe I'll inspire somebody else just the way the others have done the same and it, you know, if we all adopted that kind of attitude of of.

Looking out for each other, I just think, yeah, the world would be a better place.

A better place? Well, and I love. That you know as you're doing it, you you show us how it can be, you know the the title of your piece about this is sometimes you just have to laugh. I mean, it's fun. It's not, you know, I'm doing my weekly penance. It's you know, I'm in here. I'm with my friend who's reading along Brenda and and we're laughing and and.

Yes, yes, I mean and life is just filled with. So much so many funny moments, and sometimes they, you know, you might be in the middle of it and and you know, you're feeling agitated and angry. And but if. You look at. You look at a situation from a different perspective. Lots of times you can find the humor in it. I mean, even just the.

Right.

Pete Springer

I was talking about this traveling experience. We just went to this family, really. Union in Minnesota and it was aggravating, but at some point you just have to realize how comical this whole thing is. And you know, so we were, I, maybe I'll tell you a little bit about that. So here we are.

It was two days after that IIT event and flights we were flying Delta Airlines and flights. Were delayed and there were all kinds of people in the airport on standby. And so, you know, we were like, gosh, are we going to be able to make it to our reunion? And we had a series of three flights, and so we got up at like, 4:00 AM in the morning to catch our first 6:00 AM flight or something. And so the first flight goes from Oregon to Salt Lake City. Everything's going smooth. Ohh boy. We're in in good, great shape. We get on the plane in Salt Lake City and we think we're in good shape. We're right on time. And we're thinking, man, this is going better than we anticipated. Well. We're on the. Plane and the pilot comes on and. Says later we got the flight delay and. Then you know should be just a few minutes. We and then he. Elaborates and says so, well, we've got a couple bags that are on the plane that we need. To get off. OK, so you know, I guess I'm envisioning 10 minutes or something maybe 5 minutes later, we're still sitting there and.

Nothing you can do. And so I'm. I'm, I'm. I'm feeling a little nervous too, but I'm trying to play it like, yeah, we got this whole thing under control and I and I think we do have it under control. And so I, you know, don't worry about it, honey. We're we're we're going to be fine. And and we would have been fine.

Pete Springer
If something else didn't happen so we land, we, we we finally take off, we land in Minneapolis and. And we had another scheduled flight in. Well, our next flight was supposed to be an hour and a half an hour and a half in between. And so we're, you know, Ding the bell rings, everybody stands up to get off the plane and they couldn't get the door of the plane open. And so, you know, again, again, it's one of these things you think well.

They do this every day. This can only. Take a a minute or two. Well, after 1/2 an hour goes by, then you start to like ohh my gosh. How long are we going to be or is this going to be one of these stories where they're you're here, you know, for half a day, how they gonna feed us? How are we gonna go to the bathroom? All those things are. Yeah. And entering your mind. But anyway, we finally get off and.

And we look at the, you know, we check the app on our phones and because we know what gate we're supposed to be at, but we don't know what gate we're coming into. And so we get off the. We get off the plane and it's gate. We're at like gate a 48 and we need to be at gate F72 or something. Well, that means eight. You gotta go through all these sectors. The Minneapolis Airport is big. And so we start.

Even though we're like, this is like we have no chance. But got to give it the old college striker.

And I go into my, you know, flagging down routine. Ohh. The guy the guy stopped. The guy stops and I I'm like, you know, we're we're late. We got 5 minutes till our flights supposed to take off. Can you take us here? And and he wants to look at our phone to maybe probably make sure that I'm not some lunatic or something and he you know and he sees.

So we look and you know, go up to the agent. The next flight happens in eight hours, right. And so we're like, oh, my gosh, are we really gonna hang out in the airport? Vicki Atkinson Right. Ohh. Pete Springer 3-8 hours and so we start. You know, trying to. Decide what we're going to do and let's go rent a car. And so we ended up getting in about 11:30 that night. And no luggage or luggage didn't make it either, so it was just one thing after, but in the end it made made for a good story and and when we weren't upset, we were laughing so.

Was wondering about that right? Your luggage was who knows where.

That's great. It love it cause you've you've brought us full circle. Like, as always, you've encouraged us to make this world a better place. You've encouraged us to laugh about miss us as they happen along the way. And just. Such a good Pete story.
